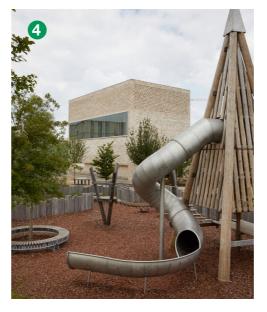

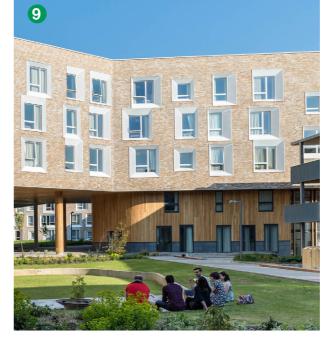














North West Cambridge Phase 1:

Landscape

Alongside the buildings and Local Centre, Phase 1 has delivered a wide range of public realm features establishing habitats and contributing to biodiversity, providing amenity for local residents and visitors, fostering active travel and connectivity throughout and beyond the site, creating points of interest and congregation through a public art strategy and generally supporting communities.

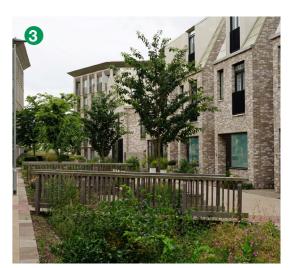
However, there have also been some lessons learnt. Most notably, the grass pitches delivered as part of the formal sports amenity provision have been under utilised. Having had the benefit of experience from Phase 1, it's become clear that better lit pitches that can be used for more hours in winter months would be more suitable to the community needs.

Another room for improvement from Phase 1 is the fragmentation of uses of the public realm. For example, there may be room for drainage systems to provide areas for play or community growing for more efficient use of the open spaces.

September

Planning Performance Agreement (PPA)

GCSPS, Design team

- An introductory session with Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Service (GCSPS) to reflect on key lessons learnt from 2013 Outline Consent, Phase 1 and the 2022 early masterplan testing, alongside defining the vision for the Future Phases of the site.
- Subsequent programme of meetings with the Quality Review Panel (QRP) and the Joint Development Control Committee (JDCC) established.

September - October

Consultation round 1 Meet the design team

Four drop in sessions were held to kick-off the public engagement with the emerging proposal.



October

PPA: Spatial layout + key approaches GCSPS, Design team

- The Design Team presented the emerging vision for the site and initial landscaping and movement strategies.
- The initial workshop with officers garnered supportive feedback for the high-level vision and ambition for the future phases of development.
- Officers sought further assessment of potential changes to previously approved scale and massing.
- Further details on community needs and travel patterns were also requested to inform the proposed development and its connections.
- Design team tested principles of the scheme across a neighbourhood.

November

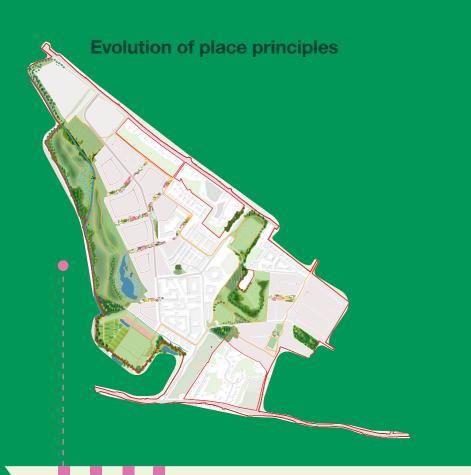
Quality Review Panel #1 QRP, JDCC, Design team

- An opportunity for the Design Team to present the principles of the places being designed and the vision for the emerging proposal.
- Panel feedback included advice on other developments to draw from, particularly in relation to street widths, overlooking, wind tunnels and noise mitigation from the M11.
- A mix of family homes, providing versatility to the market, prioritising individual front doors and having parking located away from homes were all suggestions for further exploration.
- Care over the design of the green space was raised with the suggestion that the community events be used to explore programming of space and what the existing community want to come forward.
- The Panel also suggested the need to further understand the needs of transient communities and how they could inform the design of the public realm.

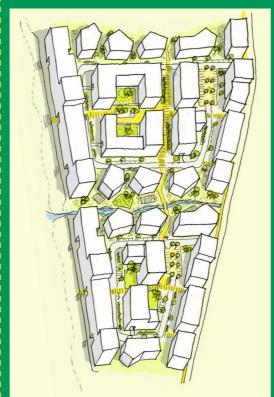

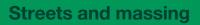

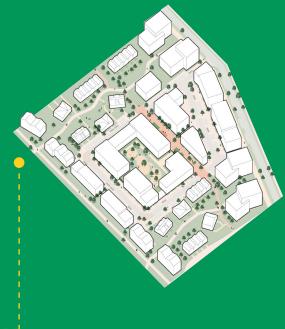

Consultation round 2

Emerging scheme

- Launched at the Eddington Winter Warmer event in Eddington Square.
- Four drop in sessions located in West Cambridge, UoC central Cambridge campus and Lion's Yard Shopping Centre and one online webinar hosted via Zoom.
- Early ideas for the Future Phases
 were communicated, to gather input
 from residents and local stakeholders
 about the kind of green spaces, sports
 pitches and outdoor amenities they
 would like to see within Eddington.
- Residents frequently emphasised the importance of preserving and improving green spaces and supporting nature, whilst creating more active travel routes and reducing motor traffic.





December

PPA: Neighbourhoods

GCSPS, Design team

- The Design Team presented the next iteration of the emerging proposal, discussing the realignment of Cartwright Avenue and initial approaches to massing for the neighbourhoods.
- Officers requested more detail on unit numbers and proposed mix of housing.
- Officers also requested key views be tested to refine the approach to massing.
- The northern area of the site was discussed as needing further layout testing with officers providing feedback on its need to connect to the wider scheme.
- Design team engaged with LVIA consultant to establish views to be tested with officers. Massing views produced for discussion with officers.

February

PPA:

Streetscape and massing GCSPS, Design team

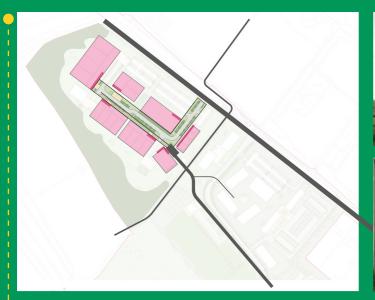
- The Design Team presented streetscape principles and approach to parking within a typical neighbourhood.
- The Design Team also prepared a series of massing views, both internal and wider views informed by LVIA consultants.
- Officers requested to see more detail on parking options for neighbourhoods, and a desire to see alternative typologies proposed.
- Officers sought more detail on unit numbers and proposed densities for the housing.
- Officers proposed initial drafts of parameter plans and codes be produced to test how the principles of the shared gardens will be realised.
- Design team produced a densities study and northern plot studies to enable discussion with officers.

March

PPA: Densities GCSPS, Design team

- The Design Team presented the emerging sitewide residential unit numbers and how that looked as a density calculation across the site.
- Whilst overall principles of density and massing was supported, officers sought further analysis of the agreed LVIA views against the 2013 scheme.
- Officers requested that the northern plots be further tested and explored.

PPA:

Design evolution, massing and northern plots

GCSPS, Design team

- The Design Team presented principles for the northern plots, establishing a street based approach to laying out massing.
- Other updates presented included, eastern plots design development, massing updates and an initial draft of parameter plans and example design codes.
- Officers requested more details on how the scheme would maintain its quality and ambition as set out in Phase 1.
- Officers sought to review the key sitewide technical strategies such as energy, transport, and drainage.
- Design team produced a draft set of parameter plans to test heights, whilst developing further proposals for the northern plots.

March - Apr

Consultation round 3 Preferred scheme



- Residents were consulted about the preferred scheme. A physical model was produced to aid discussions with the community.
- Conversations with residents saw an understanding of the massing strategies and acceptance of taller buildings in appropriate locations.
- Many residents supported the need for Future Phases to have spaces for sports and activities, echoing feedback in previous rounds.

- There were questions about road traffic and calls to increase the frequency and routes of the U Buses.
- Sustainability is a popular element of living in Eddington and consultation demonstrated residents' desire for this to continue.

Community event 2 Community Gardening Day

- The community gardening day was an opportunity to understand how people in the existing communities use green space and their perception of what makes a successful green space.
- This research has helped the design team in better understanding the needs of transient communities in the use of green spaces.

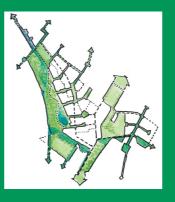

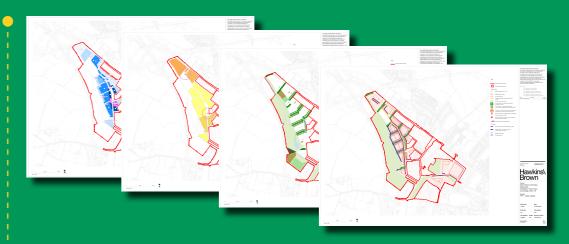

Quality Review Panel #2 QRP, JDCC, Design team

- The panel suggested reviewing the "hubs" indicating that the Common could use some activation through the use of social programming.
- The panel queried the amount of hardscape and noted that it would be desirable to see the amount of parking reduced.
- Learning from Phase 1 was highlighted as being important for sustainability and climate resilient proposals of future homes. The water and district heating systems of Phase 1 were discussed. It was suggested that more explanation be provided as to why these systems are changing in future phases.
- It was noted that Cartwright Avenue could be more of a place and suggested to use the role of mobility hubs to help create that sense of place.
- The design team reviewed the placement of "hubs" in the Parameter Plans and have included Design Codes to address QRP comments.

May

PPA: Amenity and Sport GCSPS, Landscape Architect

- The Design Team presented the site wide landscape strategy including trees, hard & soft landscape, open spaces and public realm.
- Positive feedback from Officers relating to the integration of landscape and built form.
- Discussion around incorporation of large scale trees with sufficient space between buildings.
- Landscape Officer raised the need to ensure tree planting locations are informed by the LVIA process.

May

PPA: LVIA views

GCSPS, Design team

- The Design Team presented key views that will form the LVIA.
- It was clarified that the 2013 maximum parameters were not inclusive of plant and parapets so will appear lower overall.

PPA: Parameter Plans GCSPS, Design team

- Draft Parameter plans were presented by the Design Team.
- Officers were supportive of initial draft and welcomed the inclusion of an urban design plan.
- Discussion was had as to how best to fix the open space between development plots which take the form of Shared Gardens.
- The maximum heights plan was clarified as to include storey heights so as to limit height where level changes provide more flexibility in a fixed AOD.
- Officers advised that seeing drafts of the Design Codes will enable them to see if there is outstanding areas that need described across the Parameter Plans and Codes.
- The Design Team drafted Design Codes, chaptered by "place" for review with officers and made amendments to the Parameter Plans addressing officer comments.

PPA: Northern Quarter GCSPS, Design team

- The Design Team presented the revised illustrative propsals for the northern quarter.
- Positive feedback from Officers with previous concerns having largely been addressed.
- Discussion around how the Design Codes will strengthen and ensure this area is delivered reflective of discussions.
- The Design Code and LVIA will need to establish clear parameters for the development of this area to balance commercial requirements with urban design and landscape considerations.

PPA: Design Codes GCSPS, Design team

- The Design Team had sent across the draft Design Codes for comment.
- Officers produced a tracker of comments for the Design Team to consider.
- Discussion was had as to consolidate more of the codes within the Site Wide Chapter so as to be as consistent as possible across the site.
- More detail as to "why" the codes were necessary to assist designers in the future to understand the context of the codes.
- The Design Team utilised the tracker and made updates to the structure of the codes and provided more context for future designers.

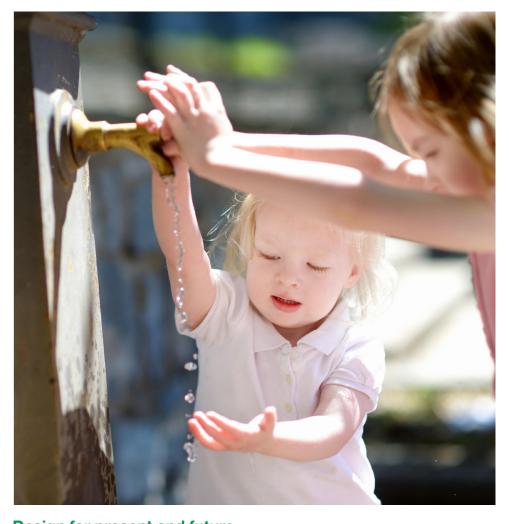


Over the past decade, there has been a growing recognition of the importance of social sustainability. The design of the public realm reflects a post-pandemic understanding of the vital role outdoor spaces play in supporting individual wellbeing and community cohesion. The proposals create places that are close to nature, encourage people to linger and connect, support walking, cycling, and active lifestyles, stimulate the mind, promote healthy diets, and offer a welcome respite from the pervasiveness of digital life.



Reduce whole place carbon

While much of the carbon impact will be determined in later design stages—through material choices and detailing—the proposal sets an early commitment to carbon reduction. In response to the climate emergency and the University's sustainability goals, the design incorporates efficient building envelopes, mid-rise forms (4–6 storeys), reducing earthworks, nature-based solutions, above-ground parking, and a strong emphasis on active travel.



Design for present and future

The proposals embrace a regenerative ethos, creating biodiverse, low-maintenance landscapes that work with the natural topography and water run offs. It integrates adaptable energy and water systems that can evolve with technological advancements, ensuring long-term resilience and sustainability.
